Faculty Spotlight


***This article is written in the words of Mark Hubbard with slight editing from the Agriculture Office Assistants.*

Student Spotlight

Logan Lowery is a senior who graduated in May 2013. He majored in Agronomy and Agriculture Business. Logan was born and raised on a family farm in Puxico, MO and attended Puxico High School. In his free time, Logan enjoys luthier work. Luthier work consist of building and working on string instruments, such as guitars.

Logan's workstation was Agronomy. Logan believes that working in the agronomy workstation helped him to put information that he has learned into a working, real world environment. By having this experience with pesticides, fertilizer, and field scouting, the job market is much more accessible. Employers are more willing to look at a graduate's resume if they have an internship and past work experience in the field.

When asked, "What made you want to become an Ag. Major?" Logan responded, "Growing up on the family farm, I've always aspired to be a farmer like my grandpa and dad. As I got older and more involved in the family farm, I learned to appreciate the culture and knowledge involved in the agriculture industry." Logan's favorite farm animal is the duck, mainly because he loves duck egg custard.

Logan participated in an internship while attending C of O. He spent two summers working for MFA Inc. in Lamar, MO. He was hired as a crop consultant both summers and scouted a between 6500 to 9000 acres per week. His job consisted of scouting fields for insects, weeds, disease, and nutrient deficiencies. Next, he decided if the problem was large enough to warrant correction and if so, advise the farmer on how to correct the problem. He also spent quite a bit of time treating soybeans and working with crop varieties with clients. Logan believes that crop science, crop production, integrated pest management, and soil management were the most beneficial classes that he took before his internship. Logan states, "I would highly advise all agriculture students to work an internship to really get a feel for the industry, and the internship helps put all of the information learned in class into a bigger picture."

Upon graduation from C of O, Logan hopes to work as a crop consultant and someday have his own independent crop consulting business.
