

Michael "Hutch" Stapp '81 Distinguished Young Alumni Award

Mr. Stapp began his career in Criminal Justice while attending The School of the Ozarks. At the age of nineteen he was picked to serve the City of Hollister as a Reserve Police Officer. This opportunity showed him how exciting law enforcement can be. Mr. Stapp graduated from S of O with a BS in Criminal Justice Administration, and then went to work for the Washington Missouri Police Department. While working for the police department he has completed over 1,000 hours of training in various fields including, breath testing, accident training, and accident reconstruction. He has served the state of Missouri as a police officer for twenty-two years and today is a Lieutenant at the Washington Police Department.

Mr. Stapp proves to be a rather active citizen in his community. He is a member of the Washington First Baptist Church. He has served as the Secretary Treasurer of the Law Enforcement Traffic Safety Advisory council, served on the O.J.J.D.P. committee for Missouri Division of Highway Safety and the Department of Revenue license plate committee. In addition to his duties as a police officer, Mike has volunteered his time with the local Babe Ruth Baseball and Softball Organization, serving as the president for the past three years. There are approximately 1,000 children who play in the organization on over 70 teams. While serving in this capacity, he was asked by Babe Ruth Headquarters to take the position of State Commissioner of Babe Ruth Softball. Last year, he also served as a task force member at the 2000 Babe Ruth 12 and under World Series in Wilson. North Carolina.

Mr. Stapp considers one of his greatest accomplishments to be the election to three consecutive

terms on the LETSAC Board. LET-SAC is an advisory board selected to give direction and lend experience to the Missouri Division of Highway Safety. Traffic officers across the state of Missouri elect this position. However, he feels that his greatest influence has been on the children of the community through the local youth sports programs. Mike says, "It was at S of O the I met my life-long sweetheart, Eileen. We have four children; Dallas, Lindsey, Logan, and Jordan. The School of the Ozarks allowed me to grow as a person and to obtain a quality education at a reasonable price. I would not have been able to afford to finish college anywhere else."

Edward Berry '65

Distinguished Achievement

Mr. Berry graduated from the School of the Ozarks Junior College in 1965 with an Associate of Science Degree. He was then accepted to the Washington State Patrol and began training as a communication officer in Vancouver, Washington. In 1986, he attended the State Patrol Academy and after graduating began his work as a Washington State Trooper. In 1977, Edward was promoted to Sergeant and was voted the "Outstanding Young Law Officer." Serving as Sergeant until 1985, he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and assigned to Kennewick, WA, as the assistant district commander.

In 1986, Mr. Berry graduated from the Northwestern Traffic Institute, then transferred to Olympia to serve as the Labor Relation Coordinator for the Patrol, writing the training manual currently in use. Until this time the Washington State Patrol had never been involved with a labor union or labor contract. His assignment was to establish a labor division unit and coordinate its development and activities. In 1989, Edward was

promoted to the rank of Captain and assigned to Everett, WA. In 1991, he was promoted to Major and then to Bureau Chief of the Washington State Police and served at this level until retiring in 1995. In 1992, he also attended Harvard and graduated from Senior Management Institute for Police.

While working as the Bureau Chief Mr. Berry was responsible for running a 2,000-person organization with an annual budget of 30 million dollars. Edward instilled a sense of family among those he worked with, this filtered throughout the sections and people he supervised. He was held in very high regard for his ability to get the job done and still treat people as the most valuable asset of the department.

Although Mr. Berry is now retired, he is still active in many activities. He is a member of the Washington Chiefs and Sheriffs Association, Exchange Club, Northwest Traffic Institute, Washington State Patrol Memorial Foundation and Retirement Association, Daly Mansion Preservation Trust, College of the Ozarks Alumni Association, and the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation. He has also been involved in many civic activities including: President of Klickitat County Fair Board, Law Enforcement Officer of the Year, Haven House Food Bank, 4-H leader, Little League baseball coach, Parent-Teacher Association, and the Special Olympics Torch Run. Church has always been a major part of his life. He has been in the choir, Christmas and Easter programs, usher, greeter, various committees, and worked on construction projects.

Even though Mr. Berry retired as the bureau chief from the number one law enforcement agency in the Northwest, he feels the greatest and most gratifying accomplishment was the raising of two wonderful sons, Shawn and Jason. "This, of course, was not a one perPage 6 Alumni News · Fall 2001

son job. Evelene and I with God's guidance completed this task and loved every minute of it," stated Mr. Berry.

When asked how S of O influenced his life Mr. Berry said, "S of O instilled in me a need for spiritual guidance, a strong sense of dedication, and a compulsion to complete work. The concept of putting God first, family second and career last has guided me throughout my life and helped me achieve balance and stability."

Vonee Hammers '82

Distinguished Community Service

Mrs. Hammers graduated from the School of the Ozarks summa cum laude in 1982 with a Bachelor's of Science in Elementary Education and substitute taught in the Branson School system for ten years before retiring.

Mrs. Hammers has given her time to many organizations. She has served a six-year term on the College of the Ozarks Associates Board, is a member of the Point Lookout/Tri-Lakes Alumni Chapter, and the Alumni Association. She has served as president of Chapter JR and Historian for Missouri State Chapter in the PEO Sisterhood and also served as a supervisory judge in Taney county elections. She is a member of the Branson Lakes Area Chamber of Commerce and Branson Housing Authority Board. The Daughters of the American Revolution have recognized Mrs. Hammers for her work in community service.

In her local community, Vonee has been involved in various clubs and organizations. She is an active member in the First Presbyterian Church where she has served as an Elder, Sunday School Teacher, Youth Leader, Educational Consultant for John Calvin Presbytery, and one of the developers of the Pre-School Program in the church. Presently she serves as Deacon, is

on the Worship and Music committee, the I Care committee, and on the combined Genevieve Lynch Committee with First Presbyterian Church and the College of the Ozarks.

Along with all her work in the church, Vonee also finds time to volunteer at the Red Cross. She has also served as an instructor and instructor trainer for CPR and First Aid in the Taney County Chapter. Mrs. Hammers has also been a foster parent for Taney County Family Services for a number of years.

Vonee considers her greatest accomplishment to be graduating Summa Cum Laude from the School of the Ozarks in 1982 after the age of fifty. She also considers being married to the most wonderful husband, the late Dr. Walter Hammers, for fifty-two years a great accomplishment. She feels The School of the Ozarks influenced her by accepting her as an older student. She said, "The college gave new meaning to my life, making me aware of the wonders of the world around me-as it is now. The exciting experience of learning is on-going as long as there is life."

Dr. Marilyn GravesDistinguished Service to College of the Ozarks

Dr. Marilyn Graves has been a part of the College of the Ozarks family since 1970. After graduating from Arkansas Technical University in 1962, Dr. Graves taught in the public school for seven years before coming to S of O as a health educator and coach. She completed her Masters and Doctorate in Education at the University of Arkansas. She has continued her education through post-doctorial studies including: workshops, seminars, and other classes. Many were sponsored by the numerous professional organizations of which she is a member. Some of these organizations include: NAIA District 16, Delta Kappa Gamma, American College of Sports Medicine, Phi Delta Kappa, American Association of School Fitness, Southern District AAHPERD, American Running and Fitness, and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

At C of O, Dr. Graves has held the positions of professor, coach, and Division Chair, as well as coordinating many events in the fieldhouse and tennis courts for the community. Dr. Graves has also served on many faculty committees including: Athletics Committee, Academic Council Member, Faculty Governance Committee, Faculty Development Committee, Chair of DESE Steering Committee, member of NACATE Accreditation Team and served on the Admissions Board. Most recently Dr. Graves accepted the National Directorship of the Men's National Tournament and is presently the Dean of the College.

She participates in Fellowship of Christian Athletes and is an active member in the First United Methodist Church, where she is serving as an elder. Her greatest sense of accomplishment comes from earning the respect of not only her colleagues, but also the students. "If I am successful in earning that respect, then my chances of being influential in the lives of the students are greater," says Dr. Graves.

Working at C of O has had a major impact on her life. "The opportunity to work with young people has made it possible for me to fulfill a lifetime goal. Having no children of my own, I was fortunate enough to be able to play a part and have an influence in students' lives. I have had the opportunity of seeing students grow and become responsible adults. And knowing that in some way I played a part in helping them reach their goals, is a reward beyond any expectations."

Airport News

Andrew T. (Drew) Smith Assistant Professor Aviation Science

The skies are busy over Point Lookout this fall. The Aviation Science Flight Training Program is alive and going strong, producing new pilots year around. Recently we adopted many improved changes to better serve our students seeking a Private Pilot Certificate or completing the Aviation Science Minor, as a pathway towards a professional pilot career. The first improvement was the purchase of two new planes; both are 2001 Cessna 172S Skyhawk SP's. These planes are in addition to the rest of our Cessna training fleet of four C-152s, two C-172Ms and the C-182RG. We still operate a Cessna 340 for administrative support.

We have also become a Cessna Pilot Center; the CPC program provides an excellent student and instructor tracking system, plus multi-media, interactive computerbased ground training for our students. This is a fantastic training program meeting our students' needs, as they are ready to learn. The benefit of this computer-based training is that students can gain aeronautical knowledge anywhere, anytime as long as there is a computer with a CD drive available, such as in our hangar, the computer labs on campus or in many of their dormitory rooms. The CPC program has names for each

course as listed: Private Pilot "Cleared for Takeoff," Instrument, "Cleared for Approach," and Commercial, "Cleared for Hire."

As the students move through this new curriculum, their progress is displayed on the computer screen and then written on their personal floppy disk. This disk is

then used to update their instructor, and the Director of Flight Training, of their aeronautical knowledge level. Also, progress cannot take place unless the student understands the concepts. In fact, if a question is answered incorrectly the program returns the student back to the video clip or unit of learning until a correct answer is provided. The system also records how many times a student attempts each question, helping the instructor to recognize a student's area of weakness. As a result, this new style of ground school allows our work/study flight instructors to spend more time in the air gaining that important flight time towards their future profession. The true benefit is a more streamlined pilot training

Another change is the merging of flight training classes and inflight training sessions within the same semester; this way the aeronautical knowledge and flight experience grow together. Applying what they learn in class the next day or two later in flight helps speed the learning process and reinforces the new concepts. Also, the certificate or rating sought during the semester is no longer a course requirement. Grades earned are issued, however, to continue, the completed certificate or rating is the prerequisite for the next set

> of courses. The flight training program continues year around, so students are always able to continue their flying over

semester breaks or even into the next semester. This remedies the incomplete grade issue and allows flexibility for finances, FAA computer testing, examiner scheduling, weather and airplane maintenance needs. We have even added two PCATD's to our program. These are Personal Computer-Based Aviation

Training Devices, a big name for desktop flight simulators. These simulators are used hours upon hours, by all of our flight students

and CIF's. The PCATD's are most helpful to our instrument students as the practice flying instrument approaches anywhere in our nation, while sitting in a no-stress, air-conditioned classroom.

The last change mentioned is the best. All Private Pilot candidates now only pay operating expenses for airplane rental. Yes, you read it right, only the cost of gas for the hours flown. Plus, if a student does not have the means to pay, the student may work off the debt through additional workweeks. This is a wonderful change and is directly related to the purpose and mission of our unique institution. One other note to you aviation folks, if Aviation Science was your major or you took any flight classes when you were here, come see us at Homecoming. Also, wear your Aviation Science or CFI jacket, if it still fits. This year is the start of the new Aviation Alumni Chapter and we would love to see you. Plus, our hangar is open for your visit any time. Call, drive, or fly in.

- 3. Nominees must complete an official nomination form listing dates and achievements.

Selection of awardees is determined by the Honors and Awards Committee, appointed by the President of the Association every two years. The Honors and Awards report of selections is approved by the Alumni Council before awards are published. Nominees' files are kept active for two years following nomination.



Friends for a Lifetime

Editor's Note: I am often told by college alumni that the friends they made at S of O/C of O are the ones they still keep in touch with---not their high school buddies. However, our high school alumni tell me that they considered each other family while they were here in the boarding high school and most are very close to their classmates today. The following has been submitted by family and friends of Bryan Silvey '92 and Darin Price '90. Their strong friendship began at CofO as young freshmen. As I have learned more about their friendship since their untimely deaths in July, I am reminded of Proverbs 27:17, "Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend."

Alumni Bryan Silvey (1992) and Darin Price (1990) set off July 28, 2001 for yet another adventure in their friendship. Their plans were to travel to the Grand Canyon with Silvey's wife Terri and friends. West bound on 1-44 headed to Springfield, their vehicle hydroplaned, due to rain, skidded across the median, striking an oncoming SUV. Both died at the scene of the accident.

Bryan Keith Silvey, 33, currently of Sullivan, Missouri grew up in the Longrun area, attended grade school at Thornfield and graduated from Gainesville High School in 1986. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in education from College of the Ozarks in 1992. He received his master's degree and specialist degree in education administration from Southwest Missouri State University in Springfield, and was finishing his dissertation for his doctoral degree at the University of Arkansas.

Upon graduation from CofO, Bryan taught history, coached baseball, and was assistant principal at Blue Eye Missouri High School for three years, going on to Reeds Spring, Missouri as assistant superintendent for three years. Later he served two years as superintendent of Gainesville schools, and was currently in his second term as superintendent at St. Clair

He had a deep love and sincere commitment for his family and was extremely proud of his farmlife upbringing and proud to be an educator of children. He was a member of the Rotary Club, Kiwanis Club, and the Lions Club. He was named "Teacher of the Year" during his first year of teaching in 1992.

Bryan is survived by his wife, Terri A. (Snowden), his parents, H.K. and Judy Silvey, two sisters, Sheryl Lawson and Elaine Burnett; one brother, Douglas Silvey; and many other family members and friends, whose lives he touched.

Darin Wayne Price, 33, of Neosho, grew up in Neosho where he attended school and graduated in 1986. He graduated College of the Ozarks with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business in 1990. Darin was an active member of the Abundant Life Assembly of God in Neosho where he worked with and counseled youth. Darin was a substitute teacher during the school year and during the summer was an umpire and worked at Sagmount Baptist Bible Camp. He had dedicated his life to doing God's will and helping others.

Darin is survived by his parents, Ron and Carolyn Price; two brothers; Derek and Doug; three nephews, Collen, Brett, and Dallas; and one niece, Reagan.

Darin and Bryan became friends in 1986 when they met at College of the Ozarks. They continued their friendship through college and became even closer as they shared in one another's joys, successes and triumphs. What one lacked in qualities, the other possessed. They made each other better and stronger by just knowing each other. They were opposite; yet, they were so much alike. Anyone who was around them could see the love and admiration they had for one another. They left this earth together on July 28, 2001 leaving a host of family and friends with a lifetime full of memories. They will be dearly missed.
