The original, handwritten bylaws from 1926 for the Alumni Association are framed and hanging in the Alumni Office. If you have any memorabilia (yearbooks, newspapers, pictures, programs et cetera) that you wish to donate to the archives of the long-awaited Alumni

Center, which is currently being renovated, you can send it to our Alumni Director or better still, "hie you hither" and bring it with you when you come for Homecoming!

The five-fold mission of College of the Ozarks that stresses academic, spiritual, vocational, cultural, and patriotic values is clearly articulated and known by all who are associated with the College. But even back in the forties, leaders of The School of the Ozarks had specific goals in mind for every student who attended. Those of us who were students when Dr. R. M. Good was president can clearly recall the message Dr. Good conveyed when he gave his chapel talk on gourds. Dr. Good loved to raise gourds! Now he did not just raise gourds for the sake of bird houses; he raised gourds so that he could use them in his

object lesson for students. As the tender, young gourds were growing, Dr. Good would carefully bend and form the gourds until he had the shape he desired. Some looked exactly as a gourd should; some had curves in the wrong places and some were very deformed and misshaped. His desire was that we would understand that we were young and in our formative years, and just as gourds could be shaped and molded, so could we. He believed that if we were trained and taught the proper values, we would become responsible and productive citizens. He never missed an opportunity to instill in us what was expected of us.

How fortunate we have been to have visionary leaders who were interested in all aspects of our development for our first (almost) 100 years, and how fortunate we are that we were able to attend School/College of the Ozarks. Let's continue to show our support for the institution we all appreciate so much with our prayers and our gifts.

#### Dr. Roy Dean Johnson '62JC Distinguished Service to College of the Ozarks

Roy Johnson along with his two brothers, Carl and Don '60, and his wife Betty (Blevins) '64 all attended Junior College at The School of the Ozarks. Roy earned his Associates of Arts degree. After graduation, Roy served in the United States Navy from 1963-1965. Later, he went back to school and received a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture Education from Southwest Missouri State in 1966, an MS in Animal Husbandry in 1970 from University of Missouri, Columbia, and his Ph.D. in Animal Husbandry in 1972, from the University of Missouri, Columbia.

Dr. Johnson has been involved in numerous organizations over the years including Vice-President and Benefactor of College of the Ozarks Alumni Association, Southwest Missouri Beef Improvement Association, Taney County Cattleman's Association (secretary for five years), Missouri Lions Club, Vice Chairman of College of the Ozarks Faculty, President of the Missouri Hereford Association, American Society of Animal Science, Bobcat Booster Club, College of the Ozarks Aggie Club Assistant Advisor, Delta Tau Alpha (Agriculture Honor Society), Gamma Sigma Delta, Boy Scout Leader, and Gideons International, where he served as vice president.

In his community, he has been busy by donating his time with the Lions Club, building a number of houses for Habitat for Humanity,

and giving blood. He has been involved in the Branson Public Utilities Planning Committee, served as an auctioneer for the Point Lookout/Tri-Lakes Alumni Chapter's Student Book Scholarship Auction, directed and helped with a number of road clean ups, assisted as a director and ring man for the Southwest Missouri Beef Cattle bull sale, and he also helped organize the Missouri College of Agriculture and Teachers Missouri Association of Colleges and Teachers of Agriculture, serving as president for two years.

In addition to Roy's loyalty to his community, he has been an active member of the College of the Ozarks Church. He has been a Sunday School teacher, deacon, and an elder. He has also helped sponsor a mission trip to the Apache Indian Reservation, as well as a number of student retreats.

When asked what his greatest accomplishment was, Roy replied, "My greatest accomplishment has been my chance to help students mature academically, vocationally, spiritually, patriotically, and culturally." Regarding his experiences at School of the Ozarks, he said, "The School of the Ozarks provided examples (Beulah Winfrey, Dr. R.M. Good, and Dr. M Graham Clark) to pattern my life after; they taught me the meaning of life is to help others."

#### Raymond Eugene Winsky '42 Distinguished Community Service

Ray Winsky graduated from The School of the Ozarks in 1942, and the Light of Men Bible Institute in 1943. He served in the U.S. Army Air Corps from 1943-1946, and later attended college at Indiana Technical College LaSalle Extension University for a year. He has participated in several transportation seminars and holds private, commercial, and instrument flight certificates, as

well as being a certified flight instructor.

During his career, Ray has held numerous important positions including Safety Engineer with **Rumsey Transportation** Engineering Company, Director of Maintenance for Dohrn Transfer Company, and Director of Maintenance for Square Deal Cartage Company. In 1972, he purchased a small local cartage company and started an airfreight business. Expanding and moving his business to Dalton, Georgia, in 1972, he named it Marco Transportation. In 1998, at the age of 73, he decided it was time for him to retire.

During a trip to Zambia, Africa, in 1999, Ray soon realized that the Lord had other plans for him in his retirement. While visiting a missionary there, he saw how bad the few roads were and thought how helpful an airplane would be in the missionary's work. He committed himself to build them an airplane that would carry four people. He flew the maiden flight on June 12, 2003. After flying the craft for 50 hours as required by the FAA, he disassembled it, loaded it in a container, and sent it to South Africa. Arriving in Zambia on April 22, 2004, and after much red tape, he reassembled the airplane and started flying for several missionaries there. He writes, "What a rewarding experience it is. It's amazing to see just how the Lord meets each and every need in His own perfect timing. On June 16, we made our first mission trip that would have taken the missionaries three to four days by car...that makes me feel the airplane was all worthwhile."

Ray is a member of the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA), the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association (AOPA), and a lifetime member of the College of the Ozarks Alumni Association. He attends Southside Baptist Church, which supports many

missionaries, including the one for which the plane was built.

When asked about his greatest accomplishment, he said, "I feel my greatest accomplishment was building the airplane. It was and is a labor of love, since I belong to the Lord. The sole purpose of the project is carrying the gospel of Jesus Christ into all the provinces of Zambia—reaching people in villages that have never heard the name of Jesus. I am honored to use whatever talents I have in His service."

Regarding his S of O/C of O experience, he says, "It would be impossible to put a value on the influence The School of the Ozarks has had on my life. Mr. Parkey was a mentor to me and I have leaned heavily on his teaching and instruction all of my working life. Ms. Ross was another person for whom I had great respect. More important than the academics, I learned honesty, integrity, work ethics, and faith; that is something most colleges cannot claim."

#### Earl Edward Woodard '38 Distinguished Achievement Award

Earl Woodard, along with his brother Harvey Woodard, attended School of the Ozarks in the 1930's, after growing up at the Presbyterian Children's Home in Farmington, Missouri. Earl is a 1938 graduate and attended Southwest Missouri State University for three years after graduation. In 1941, he left college to enlist in the United States Army Air Corps. While in the Army Air Corps, he was commissioned as a 2nd Lt. Navigator in 1942, and served in the 8th Air Force out of England from 1943, until he was shot down over France in 1944. He was able to escape with the help of the resistance across the Pyrenees Mountains into Spain and thereafter to England and finally home. Discharged as a captain in

1945, Earl and his wife, Nancy, began their own business, Woodard Cleaning and Restoration Services in 1946. Earl and Nancy were married for almost 60 years; Nancy passed away August 1, 2004.

Throughout his career, Earl has served as President and Chairman of the Board of the National Institute of Rug Cleaning, President of the Association of Specialists in Cleaning and Restoration International. He has served on the Board of Trustees and as Chairman of the Board of the Presbyterian Children's Home, and was a participating member in his local Lions Club. In addition. Earl has been an active member at the First Presbyterian Church of Kirkwood for 55 years, serving as an elder and on a number of committees.

When asked what is his greatest accomplishment and sphere of influence, Earl replied, "I hope they have been our family. Certainly it is they of whom we are most proud...all college graduates, active church members and fine parents. I am proud, too, of the many faithful employees I've been privileged to mentor over 56 years."

Regarding his C of O/S of O experiences, Earl said, "College of the Ozarks alumni went to Hard Work U. May I say that we School of the Ozarks alums went to Hard Work High School?...where we

learned that finishing a job well done was satisfying far beyond the assigned task and that the value placed on friendship was reinforced by the pleasure in cooperative effort. Finally, I must credit Dr. R.M. Good, whose vision for the school continues. He exemplifies the positive influence The School of the Ozarks had on my life...and it still does!"

#### Dr. John Friesen '89 Outstanding Young Alumnus

John Friesen graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in May 1989, from The School of the Ozarks, going on to earn his M.D. degree at the University of Manitoba, graduating in 1995. In 1998, Dr. Friesen completed residency training in Family Practice at Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio. In 1999, he received board certification by the American Board of Family Practice.

Dr. Friesen has held several important positions after finishing his formal education. He was an ER Fast Track Physician in Bellefontaine, Ohio, a Family Physician in Mount Eaton, Ohio, a Medical Missionary in Haiti for over a year, and an ER Physician in Crestline, Ohio. Presently, he is a Family Physician at Boundary Regional Community Health Clinic in Bonners Ferry, Idaho, having accepted the position in March 2003. His career emphasis is in providing health care to people

with limited resources.

Since 1996. Dr. Friesen has been a member of the American Academy of Family Physicians, the Ohio Academy of Family Physicians, and the Christian Medical and Dental Society of Canada. Since moving to Idaho, he is a member of Kootenai Valley Mennonite Church. While living in Ohio, he was a member of the United Bethel Mennonite Church in Plain City, where he was a Sunday school teacher and member of the Mission Board, which made financial appropriations for mission-related projects and activities. John is also a lifetime member of the College of the Ozarks Alumni Association.

When asked what is his greatest accomplishment and sphere of influence, he said, "My greatest accomplishment is my position as a family physician and my most important sphere of influence is my practice of medicine—my interaction with people for whom I provide care."

Regarding his S of O/C of O experience he says, "First of all, The School/College of the Ozarks gave me the academic background that gave me the opportunity to pursue a professional career. Secondly, The School/College of the Ozarks reinforced in me a strong work ethic and the value of a disciplined approach to one's goals and objectives. Finally, The School/College of the Ozarks, in its diversity, broadened my cultural horizon, which helps me to better relate to people in my practice of medicine."



#### Categories and Eligibility:

- 1. Meritorious Alumni Award for Distinguished Achievements—College of the Ozarks Alumni
- 2. Distinguished Community Service Award—College of the Ozarks Alumni
- 3. **Distinguished Young Alumni Award**—any College of the Ozarks alumnus who has graduated less than twenty years ago and is not older than forty-five
- 4. Award for Distinguished Service to College of the Ozarks—faculty, staff and administration, friends or any other worthy individual


#### **Guidelines:**

- 1. The nominee must be living at the time of notification of the Award selection and be present, if possible, at Homecoming to accept the award.
- 2. Nominees must show current and continued interest in College of the Ozarks.
- 3. Nominees must complete an official nomination form listing dates and achievements.

Selection of awardees is determined by the Honors and Awards Committee, appointed by the President of the Association every two years. The Honors and Awards report of selections is approved by the Alumni Council before awards are published. Nominees' files are kept active for two years following nomination.

## New Class Introduced in the Fall Semester

## C of O Leadership Development Program

CALL— "C of O Academy of Lifestyle Leadership" is a new extracurricular class that will provide instruction on leadership principles and how to apply them to various areas of life on campus, as well as the world beyond the Gates of Opportunity. The class will meet every other week for a semester in the evenings for an interactive, hands-on learning experience in a relaxed environment. The participants will be 22 sophomores, with eight faculty and staff and will be offered each semester. Each two-hour session will cover topics such as service, work ethic, time management, team building, public speaking, goal setting, personal influence, and many other beneficial skills. All sessions will be taught by C of O employees and students.

Homework will revolve around applying the principles set forth in each session, including writing a personal mission statement, and an action plan for their area of influence. Additionally, there will be a group service project required of each of the sixmember groups within the class.

Goals for the program include a common understanding of C of O's vision, integration of the five purposes, excellence in all areas of life on campus and beyond, a broader level of leadership on campus and another opportunity for continued involvement with alumni. The success of C of O has always been in the common vision and commitment of students and alumni, and CALL will continue to promote that unity.

This program is the culmination of a year-long planning committee made up of faculty, staff and students. It came from goals set out in the College's strategic plan to increase leadership development. This year marks the centennial of the St. Louis World's Fair where the big log cabin representing the State of Maine made its debut. Maine's exhibit later became known as Dobyns Hall at The School of the Ozarks, and served as home to our early students from 1915 until it was destroyed by fire in 1930.

A new big log cabin—The Keeter Center, named for Taney County pioneers Vestal and Ruby Keeter, came in service during September of this year at College of the Ozarks. Replicating Dobyns Hall in its exterior design, the building will serve as host to the character education forums each semester as well as

providing fine lodging and dining facilities for the public. Interior displays and furnishings are designed to inform visitors as to what College of the Ozarks is all about.

It seems fitting at this time for us to reminisce once again as to the history of the big log cabin known as Dobyns Hall and how it represents the pioneer spirit and vision that has brought this College to its present-day greatness. We trust that The Keeter Center will serve to keep us mindful of our history, the dreams of our founders, and the importance of keeping true to the mission that has stayed us for almost 100 years.

## Dobyns Hall—The Big Log Cabin They Built Upon

Destinies, twists of fate, luck, divine providence—whatever name you wish to give to the forces that are often seen working in the lives of people, the results are sometimes amazing and remarkably successful.

Such is the story of Dobyns Hall, a centerpiece of School of the Ozarks from 1915 until it burned in 1930. From its stint in the 1904 World's Fair as the Maine Building, then as the lodge of the Maine Hunting and Fishing Club along the White River, and later dubbed Dobyns Hall at The School of the Ozarks, to describe this structure as a large log cabin doesn't do it justice. It always represented much more than the logs that composed it.

Designed as Maine's exhibit for

the Plateau of States in the 1904 World's Fair in St. Louis celebrating the centennial of the Louisiana Purchase, the project began under a cloud of controversy. Many people of Maine felt that the log cabin styled structure was not the right choice to represent the state at the elaborate and important event which would cost over \$50,000,000 to organize and display, drawing visitors from all across the world.

While some in Maine had doubts about the appropriateness of the design by distinguished architect John Calvin Stevens of Portland, Maine, it was not shared by World's Fair organizers.

Louisiana Purchase Exposition President D.R. Francis praised the plans as elegant and appropriate,

and predicted the Maine Exhibit would be one of the most attractive buildings on the Exposition grounds.

With a budget of only \$40,000 for the state's project, the Maine commission overseeing the construction of a state exhibit for the Fair felt it was their only option. Plans for the building were approved, and despite lingering unhappiness and unfavorable press stating the building would only "misrepresent" the state, work on the building got underway in the woods near Little Machinas Lake, Maine, in November of 1903, six months after the Exposition grounds were officially dedicated by U.S. President Theodore Roosevelt.

A.E. Astle of Houlton, Maine, was awarded the contract to build

the structure. Astle planned to have the large structure built in the Maine woods and then disassembled by the workmen from Maine.

By its completion, the two-story log cabin was comprised of 90,000 feet of peeled spruce logs, and used 90,000 "Maine-made" shaved shingles on the roof. Weighing in at 767,000 pounds, it would take 21 railroad cars of the Bangor and Aroostook Railroad Company and a cost of \$2,000 to transport the building. Despite weather and labor problems at the site there, the building was completed on time.

With the press of a golden key, thousands of banners were unfurled on April 30, and the 1904 World's Fair was open to the world. The Maine Exhibit covered an area of 5,300 square feet, not counting the large piazzas which surrounded it. In total the building was 140 feet long and 68 feet wide, with three gables on the front. The center gable was the main entrance to the building and featured pillars and a portico.

The first floor had 11 rooms, and there were 10 on the second floor. Visitors entering the building were greeted by the large stone fireplace opposite the two-story entrance. Directly above the entrance door was a gallery which linked the two wings of the second story.

"The Big Log Cabin," as it was dubbed by an unfavorable news report after its plans were approved, was indeed one of the more popular sites at the World's Fair. Reports noted large crowds on the piazzas of the building every morning waiting for entrance, and it seemed very much in place in the heavily-wooded southeastern section of the Exposition grounds in St. Louis. The simple style also seemed more attractive and inviting to visitors than the more ornate and grand exhibits from larger and wealthier states.

From May through December of 1904 the log cabin played host to not only visitors from across the country, but also tourists from around the world. At the close of the World's Fair all the Exposition buildings had to be removed from the site within 90 days. Maine State commissioners weren't interested in paying to have the building dismantled and shipped home, so they presented the building for removal and sale at \$8,000. Little interest in purchasing the building would be shown until the price was lowered to \$2,000. At the time of the sale the buyers remained anonymous, and speculations were that the building would be moved to Atlantic City, New Jersey. The rumors proved to be incorrect as the purchasers were members of The Maine Hunting and Fishing Club of St. Louis who planned to use the building as a hunting and fishing lodge. The building was relocated to property which the club owned on the White River near Hollister, Missouri.

At the same time the building was undergoing construction in preparation for the Exposition, plans were also being made in Forsyth, Missouri, for the creation of a high school to serve communities in Southwest Missouri and Northwest Arkansas. This school would become known as The School of the Ozarks, and

though unimagined at the time, the Maine exposition building would play a pivotal role in the future of this fledgling school.

By April 1915 the building and the 207 acres it sat upon were up for sale, and The School of the Ozarks was looking for a new home after a fire in January of that year had destroyed the principal building on its site in Forsyth. The log cabin was large enough for staff and students of the school, with room for expansion, and the acreage offered opportunities for the school to become more self-sufficient and less dependent on sporadic donations to operate.

School trustees purchased the property for \$15,000 and the "Maine Club Farm" became the new home for The School of the Ozarks. The school began classes in September of 1915 with a little over \$20 in the bank, no president, five staff members, and the largest enrollment that the work-study school had ever seen.

Official dedication of the school was held on October 28. The north wing of the building, including the assembly hall, was named Mitchell Chapel, with the center of the building dubbed Dobyns Hall after trustee board president William R. Dobyns, a staunch and tireless supporter of the school.

It had been obvious from the start that the log cabin's naturally cool climate did not have the same

soothing effect on students that it had on visitors during the exposition. With only a large fireplace and three coal-burning baseboard heaters, all on the first floor, the dorm rooms above (which housed both students and staff) had to be heated by small wood stoves.

The second floor of the building was designated for female staff and students. The upper floor of the annex was home for the male students and staff. The annex was comprised of the kitchen and basement storage areas and would later house the school's first printing operations. The large room with the fireplace on the ground floor was used for weekly social hour activities. The wide wooden steps in front of the building were excellent for sitting and enjoying the quiet Ozarks beauty with fellow students—not that there was a lot of time for watching sunsets.

Despite the great potential of the farm which included over 8,000 fruit trees, it was still a struggle for the school to survive. Within five months of the school's opening in the new location, there were the problems of crowded student quarters, poor heating in the building, and less than desirable studying conditions.

When not in class, students and staff alike were working at chores to keep the farm and the school going. While money and supplies may have sometimes been in short supply, faith and a willingness to work was in abundance. And, this commitment would pay off. Slowly the school was able to grow, adding additional buildings, students, staff, and commercial ventures to earn operating funds.

Within two years the farm was yielding not only enough vegetables for use by the school, but also enough for canning and sale. Can label design would feature the centerpiece of the school, Dobyns Hall, acting as a

small advertisement on each can, helping to spread the word about the unique qualities of The School of the Ozarks. With each purchase of a can, people were supporting the school and its educational goals.

But Dobyns Hall was more then just a high school, it was also home in every sense of the word to the students who had placed their faith in the institution, having become a part of the large school family.

Dobyns Hall would remain the backdrop of the school during the fluctuating enrollment and hardships of World War I, as well as the optimism of the Roaring Twenties and onto the looming difficulties of The Great Depression.

After several changes in leadership, a much-needed sense of stability came to the school with the appointment of Robert M. Good as the school president. His new home would be a room screened off the porch of Dobyns Hall, and another room in the building would eventually become his office.

While the school grounds and the students using them had changed, Dobyns Hall remained basically the same—except the old annex at the end of the building was torn down in 1925 and a new print shop constructed in its place. The farm itself also continued to improve, and by 1927, 45,000 to 50,000 cans of fruits and vegetables were being processed by students at the school. From sewing and secretarial work to hauling rocks and construction, student labor was building The School of the Ozarks, while the young people improved their futures through education.

Dobyns Hall would be the mainstay of the school's campus for 15 years and despite plans to build a heating plant and update heating within the log building, fate would again play a hand in the future of

the school and Dobyns Hall. On February 1, 1930, a fire began in the building and in less than an hour the big log cabin which had delighted both World's Fair visitors and hopeful young Ozarks students was gone. The loss of Dobyns Hall couldn't be measured. Though the Green Administration Building (which had been constructed the year before) was the center of student activities, Dobyns Hall represented the true pioneering spirits of the students and teachers who had found shelter within it.

Through the years The School of the Ozarks realized the dreams of its founders, and Dobyns Hall became a distant memory of a few and an interesting historical note for the school. Through the talent of artist Charles Summey, the grace and beauty of Dobyns Hall can be seen once again (see back cover). Summey has painted a beautiful portrait of Dobyns Hall in winter, and the painting graces the Alumni Association Office on the campus of College of the Ozarks. Summey, who resides in Springfield, is well-known for his painting of early American scenes and wildlife, as well as a leading western and landscape artist. Summey's thoughtful research of the building is reflected in his exceptional painting of it. Those who view it cannot help but be struck by the beauty and warmth of "The Big Log Cabin."

Though spoken six years after the loss of the log cabin, the words of J. Hugh Wise, the 1936 senior class president and yearbook editor, during a Dobyns Day speech reflects the importance of the school and the legacy of Dobyns Hall:

"We have made the School our home while we have been here. Mr. Good has been so faithful to us, and his presence among us and his love for the school has inspired us to follow him in

helping to make a home here which we can love....These buildings and their beauty of location makes for the building of our ideals, and Mr. Good in his wisdom and foresight is building here a school that just naturally builds character and puts moral strength into us all."

Not a bad success story for a log cabin and a school which both

began as acts of faith and merged to create a heritage of hard work and a commitment to Christian education; these still define College of the Ozarks, "Hard Work U," today.

[Note: All of the background research on the history of the Maine Exposition Building and later Dobyns Hall was provided by Mr. J. Hugh Wise, an Alumni Association Council Member, who contacted numerous sources in both Maine and Missouri in his search for information.
