Edith May Gittinger Sept. 14, 1909 - Feb. 1, 2003

College of the Ozarks bid a fond farewell to longtime friend and benefactor Edith May Gittinger on February 4. Williams Memorial Chapel was filled with friends and

family in a service that celebrated the life and good works of this wonderful Christian lady.

Mrs. Gittinger and her husband, Leonard, were married 64 years. Natives of Iowa, the Gittingers moved to the Ozarks in 1972 and became interested in the College. Over the years, they helped countless C of O students by providing scholarship funds to help them attend college in Point Lookout and also to go on to graduate school or seminary.


In addition to helping students individually, the Gittingers endowed the College of the Ozarks Community Convocation Series and at present have two building projects under construction at the College. The buildings, which will house the Music and Campus Ministries departments, will bear the Gittingers' names.

Mrs. Gittinger taught school for three years in a one-room schoolhouse, teaching primary through eighth grades. She then attended nursing school and served as a practicing registered nurse for over 30 years. She was an Elder in the College of the Ozarks Presbyterian Church, active in the American Red Cross, in various prayer groups and women's organizations, and worked with Leonard in the Gideons International Organization.

She is survived by her husband, nieces and nephews in Montana and Iowa, and hundreds of people at C of O and beyond who consider themselves part of the Gittingers' extended family.

Memorials may be made to the College of the Ozarks for the Edith M. Gittinger Memorial Nursing Scholarship.



REGULAR GIFTS

Every year, College of the Ozarks receives contributions from individuals, corporations, and foundations all across the country that support our ongoing work. These cash gifts comprise the backbone of our development program, and we depend on them

to meet our daily obligations. For the most part, these gifts come out of a person's monthly income.

SPECIAL GIFTS

As a growing and vital organization, the College periodically seeks to raise additional funds for building expansion, endowment growth and other special projects and purposes. An example of this is the recent Chapel Restoration Campaign. We challenge our donors to make a larger gift, something beyond their regular amount. Such gifts may come from savings or brokerage accounts and may represent a significant commitment. While the number of donors making special or major gifts may be smaller than the number of regular donors, these generous gifts are extremely important to our financial health.

Focus on Patriotism

Roy Hopper and Other Heroes

At a time when our nation's freedom is again at stake, this story is both a solemn reminder of the personal sacrifice of past heroes who fought for our country, and a challenge to support the military forces who are currently serving around the world.

* * *

I was among the 4,000 packed into Keeter Gymnasium the night General Colin Powell was our honored guest. It was October 2, 2000, and, while I confess I don't recall much about his speech, it was an evening I'll never forget.

Typical of major programs on campus is the recognition of individuals for various types of outstanding service. One of four honorees that night was Mr. Roy Hopper. Until then, his was not a name particularly recognizable. Roy Hopper, Dr. Davis explained, was a student at The School of the Ozarks in 1943 when he left his education unfinished to serve in WWII. Shortly after basic training, he was taken prisoner in a labor camp. He and others miraculously managed to escape more than nine months later after much hardship and horrors untold.

After relating this story, Dr. Davis and General Powell presented Roy Hopper with his high school diploma from The School of the Ozarks—well over half a century late. Needless to say, Mr. Hopper (in his mid-seventies) received a thunderous standing ovation, and I daresay there were few dry eyes among the crowd. I still get chills thinking about that incredible moment.

Several days later, I wrote Mr. Hopper a personal note. His story had brought to my mind another unknown WWII hero, my uncle, Pvt. Clinton Bray, USMC. He was one of hundreds of servicemen who died defending his country on the island of Iwo Jima, and was only 19 years old. "I can't thank Uncle Clint for giving his life, but it isn't too late to honor and thank you for serving our country," I wrote.

Admittedly, I had seldom thought about Clinton until 50 years after he died when I compiled his memoirs for my family. The book included letters, photos,

a reproduction of his Purple Heart medal, and the somber telegram his parents received about his death. The project had given me a much broader perspective of Clint's supreme sacrifice. Now I had also

gained a humbling appreciation for the sacrifice that Roy Hopper and others had made.

* * *

Fast-forward to September 2, 2002, which happened to be my birthday, and the annual fall picnic for College faculty, staff, and families. I heard Mr. Hopper was on campus and would be attending the festivities. What a wonderful and unexpected birthday gift it was to have the genuine honor of personally meeting this real-life hero. We talked and took photos, and I presented Roy with a copy of Uncle Clint's book.

Since then, we have emailed more frequently, chatted by phone, and Mr. Hopper recently asked my permission to use my uncle's book in some New Mexico high schools. Through this means, readers can catch a glimpse into the personal life of this young man who left home and never returned. One can also sense the

pride Clint felt in serving his country as a Marine, and the depth of his family's emotions as they dealt with the tragic news of his death.

I am proud that Uncle Clint served our country, and it is an honor to call Roy Hopper my friend. Often, I think of these two war heroes when I hear our national anthem and my heart swells with pride, yet I find myself blinking back some tears.

* * *

There are two tangible ways to respond to this article. 1) Commit to pray for those presently defending our country and support them however you can. 2) If you know a Roy Hopper or a Clinton Bray someone who served their country, even risked or lost their life doing so—I urge you to take time to honor them and all our veterans, particularly those from the WWII era. As these individuals pass from our midst, we are losing a precious part of our heritage. Consider investing some time researching their personal stories. No doubt you'll gain a fresh respect for their service to our country, but also some insight into their uncelebrated heroism.

What sets Jamison apart from the 20 or so people eating lunch at the Tower Club and listening to their president prompt them to service? He is African-American in a room full of white faces. He is youthful in a room filled with mostly retired businessmen, And he has plans for the future.

Jamison, 51, doesn't see himself as being much different from his fellow Kiwanians. He joined the club 13 years ago because he was invited. He was also invited to run for president.

He takes his new job seriously because he sees it as an opportunity to serve. Service is what Jamison, a rehabilitation counselor with the education department, and Kiwanis are all about.

To one standing at the windows of the Tower Club, looking out at downtown Springfield, Jordan Valley Park's landscape is obvious. "But there's much more that needs to be done," said Jamison, pointing out pockets of blight, schools with youngsters who need help and encouragement, the poor and unemployed.

Jamison has lived in a world that includes whites and blacks, rich and poor, educated and uneducated.

What he focuses on is what all those people share. "I try to convey what we have in common," he said. "Not our differences."

Born in Little Rock, Jamison lived in Oklahoma, attended what was then The School of the Ozarks, moved to Nebraska and New Mexico, then returned to the Ozarks. "When you move, you're forced to learn to adapt," he said. "You see issues that impact others, and you can derive so much from that."

That is also what he believes service organizations such as Kiwanis can do—point out issues and respond to needs. "That's what I like about this club," he said.


Serving as president of the Downtown Kiwanis is more than a positive step forward for a black man in a predominately white society. It is a step forward in Jamison's "own personal journey... the experience life has laid before" him. "It's my way of reinvesting myself in the community," he explained.

His investment is especially aimed at youth. His only child, daughter Lonita, died in a vehicle accident five years ago, when she was 15. Today, Jamison wants to reach out to young people though Kiwanis. The club sponsors Circle K and Key Clubs at Central and Kickapoo high schools, and Jamison wants to start a Builders Club at Pipkin Middle School. "If you don't get involved early, in high school influencing them is difficult," he said.


And he would like 12 new faces at Kiwanis to include men, women, black, white, Hispanic, Asian and more.

Each Friday at noon, the club meets on the 22nd floor of Hammons Tower. Jamison invites anyone interested in service and fun to stop in.






